Lakers (3/20), leaving the game at the 2:12 mark in the first quarter with a right ankle sprain)...The Lakers game ended his streak of 89 consecutive contests scoring in double-figures...Scored 30-plus points 19 times...Led or co-led the team in scoring 45 times...Led or co-led the team in assists 17 times...Registered one double-double (at Minnesota (4/17) - 34 points, 10 rebounds)...Scored a season-high 40 points against New York (3/25)...Pulled down a season-high 10 rebounds at Minnesota (4/17)...Handed out a season-high nine assists against Indiana (11/28)...Shot 88.3 percent (378-428) from the foul line to tie for seventh in the NBA...Named Western Conference Player of the Week twice (his third and fourth time as a Sonics player)...For the week ending 11/15, led Seattle to a 4-0 record averaging 28.3 points, 5.3 rebounds and 4.3 assists...For the week ending 3/27, averaged 28.7 points, 8.3 rebounds and 1.7 assists...Named to the NBA All-Star Team for the fifth time in his career and was the game's top scorer with 17 points...Participated in the 2005 Foot Locker Three-Point Shootout contest at 2005 NBA All-Star Weekend for the fourth time in his career...Had a viral infection and missed two games (against San Antonio (1/31) and at Sacramento (2/1))...Suffered a right ankle sprain and missed two games (against Milwaukee (3/22) and at Houston (4/20))...**PLAYOFFS:** Started all 11 playoff games and averaged 26.5 ppg, 4.3 rpg and 3.9 apg...Tied a Sonics single-game playoff record by scoring 45 points in the first-round Game 4 matchup against Sacramento (5/1) (Fred Brown - 45 points on 4/15/76)...Averaged 32.4 points in the five-game Sacramento series...Shot 51.4 percent (55-107) from the field in the Sacramento series and 97.1 percent (33-34) from the line...In 11 playoff games, scored 30-plus points four times...**2003-04:** Averaged 23.0 ppg, 5.1 rpg, 4.8 apg, 1.27 spg and 38.4 mpg in 56 games (all starts)...Scored a season-high 42 points against Portland (1/5)...Handed out a season-high 11 assists at Minnesota (3/31)...Pulled down a season-high 11 rebounds against Philadelphia (2/19)...Scored 20-plus points 39 times...Scored 30-plus points eight times...Scored 40-plus points three times...Led or co-led the team in scoring 32 times...Led or co-led the team in assists 11 times...Had six double-doubles...Sat out the first 25 games of the season due to right ankle surgery (missed 26 games overall)...Had

COLLEGE: 1995-96 (Junior season): Consensus All-America First Team selection by The Associated Press, John Wooden-Los Angeles Athletic Club, UPI, The Sporting News, U.S. Basketball Writers Association (USBWA) and the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC)...Named UPI's College Player of the Year...Became the first UConn player ever to earn All-America recognition in back-to-back seasons...1996 Big East Player of the Year and a unanimous All-Big East First Team pick...Helped lead the Huskies to a school-record 32-3 mark, including a third-straight appearance in the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament...Also in that season, helped UConn win both the Big East regular-season title (17-1 record) and the Big East Tournament...Finished No. 3 on the Huskies' career-scoring list with 1,922 points behind Chris Smith (2,415) and Tony Hanson (1,990)...Set UConn's single-season record by connecting on 115 three-pointers in 1995-96...Led the Huskies in scoring for the second-straight season with 818 points, which ranked second all-time on the school's single-season scoring list (Donyell Marshall, 855, 1993-94)...Tied the Big East single-game record (and set UConn's single-game mark) with nine three-pointers in 14 attempts against Rutgers, culminating in a career-high 39 points...**1994-95** (Sophomore season): Became the second UConn player (along with Donyell Marshall) to earn a spot on the All-Big East First Team, leading his squad and ranking third in the Big East in scoring (21.1 ppg)...Was the top sophomore scorer in UConn history with 675 points in 32 games...Named to the Big East All-Tournament Team...**1993-94** (Freshman season): Selected unanimously to the Big East All-Rookie Team after averaging 12.6 ppg (despite coming off the bench every game) and 4.6 rpg...Named the Big East Rookie of the Week five times during the season.
